

Field Trips

Bancroft Trip discussed. Dave Millis gave the following plans -

Thurs, July 21st Travel to Bancroft. PM dig nearby for green apatite.

Friday July 22nd Bear Lake and Craig Mont. For sapphire crystals that are either 4" long or 2" in diameter - but never both.

Sat. Marmora Quarry for a lg. assortment of minerals. You need 5 safety items for here: hard hat, safety glasses, gloves, safety vest and steel-toed shoes.

Sunday: local mineral show [Bill Chapman won the door prize 5 minutes after getting there!]

Monday: to be announced. Tuesday: Travel back home.

It was discussed whether this trip is open to other clubs and it was decided that it was a Wayne County Club dig only. If others want to come, they need to join.

The trip to Ohio has been canceled and a fossil dig at Flint Creek has been added on July 31^{st} at 1:00 PM. There is always water here so be prepared. Terry Wilson will lead this trip.

Next month is Newarkfest. On Friday June 10th, we'll meet at 5 PM to set up tables and our program at 7 PM is on wirewrapping. This set up to sell rocks is a forerunner for Syracuse. Ken Rowe reported that the church has approved our set up on church grounds for Newarkfest. We need to make sluice bags so members need to bring small specimens on Friday night for this project. The Straw Draw will be in use. Donations to the case are needed. Raffle tickets for the fossil from Middleport NY will begin. Tickets will cost \$3 a piece or 2 for \$5. Bill Lesniak will be preparing those tickets. They'll be sold from June 10^{th} to July 10^{th} and awarded at 3PM at the Syracuse Show. Jerry D. made the motion to do so & ken Rowe seconded it. Passed. Individuals may sell at this show through the club. Ten percent will go to the club and sales tax will be paid. The remainder goes to the individual. A list of your items is needed as well as initials & prices on your items. If you will negotiate price, please note.

We will be using a "U" shaped formation at the Syracuse Show. Volunteers to man the tables are needed. 20 THINGS YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT CRYSTALS

- 1. It's all about the rhythm: Crystals are repeating, three-dimensional arrangements of atoms, ions, or molecules.
- 2. Almost any solid material can crystallize even DNA. Chemists from New York University, Purdue University, and the Argonne National Laboratory recently created DNA crystals large enough to see with the naked eye. The work could have applications in nanoelectronics and drug development.
- 3. One thing that is *not* a crystal" leaded "crystal" ball, like the vases that so many newlyweds dread. (Glass consists of atoms or molecules all in a jumble, not in the well-patterned order that defines a crystal.)
- 4. The oldest known piece of our planet's surface are 4.4 billion-year-old zircon crystals from the Jack Hills of western Australia.
- 5. The center of the earth was once thought to be a single, 1,500-mile-wide iron crystal. Seismic studies now show that the inner core is not a single solid but perhaps an aggregate of smaller crystals.
- 6. Tiny silicate crystals, which need high temperatures to form have been found inside icy comets from the solar system's distant chilly edges. Powerful flares from the sun may have provided the necessary heat.
- 7. In Chihuahua, Mexico, a limestone cavern 1,000 feet below the surface contains the largest crystals in the world: glittering gypsum formations up to 6 feet in diameter and 36 feet long, weighing as much as 55 tons.
- 8. You may be sitting in a gypsum cave right now: It is a primary component of drywall.
- 9. Are the streets of New York paved with gold? No; but the bedrock schist beneath them is studded with opal, beryl, chrysoberyl, garnet and three kinds of tourmaline.
- 10. In 1885 a garnet weighing nearly 10 pounds was discovered beneath 35th Street near Broadway, close to today's Macy's store. According to urban lore, it was unearthed either during subway construction or by a laborer digging a sewer.
- 11. Cheaper by the pound: The so-called Subway Garnet was sold within a day, reportedly for \$100 just \$2,300 in today's dollars.
- 12. The unit of measure for gemstones had humble beginnings. "Carat" comes from the Greek *keration*, or "carob bean," which was used as a standard for weighing small quantities. It is equivalent to 200 milligrams, or about 0.007 ounce.
- 13. When Richard Burton bought Elizabeth Taylor the heart-shaped Taj-Mahal diamond, he is said to have bragged, "It has so many carats, it's almost a turnip."
- 14. A "fancy intense pink" diamond recently set a world record when it was purchased at auction for \$46 million by a London jeweler.
- 15. The Cullinan diamond is the largest known gem diamond or actually, *was*. It weighed 3,106 carats, or nearly a pound and a half, when it was discovered in South Africa in 1905, but it has since been cut into more than 100 stones.
- 16. The Cullinan stones, all flawless, are now part of the British Regalia, The largest, a 530-carat behemoth, is set in the English scepter.
- 17. For the rest of us, there is crystallized sodium chloride, otherwise known as salt. We are literally awash in it: If the water were evaporated from the world's oceans, we'd be left with 4.5-million cubic miles of salt, equivalent to a cube measuring 165 miles on each side.
- 18. Another crystal for commoners: sugar. Each American eats an average of more than 130 pound of it each year.
- 19. As if sugar's ties to obesity and tooth decay weren't enough, new research out of Imperial College London suggests that it contributes to high blood pressure, too.
- Snow is near-pure crystallized water, but when it collects on the ground it acts as a reservoir for atmospheric pollutants such as mercury and soot. So you probably shouldn't eat the *white* snow either.

Dig For Dinosaurs – South Dakota School of Mines a& Technology, various locations Popular Science www.popsci.com

The tectonic forces that raised the Rocky Mountains also buried and preserved many dinosaurs. This makes the American West a playground for today's fossil-hunters. The Field Paleo program at the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology's Museum of Geology runs several digs and welcomes visitors to participate in trips of four to 11 days. Options include hunting for Ice Age fossils in Oregon, stegosauruses in Wyoming, and marine reptiles along the Missouri River in South Dakota. Working with paleontologists, you'll learn dinosaur classification and anatomy, and map and preserve your findings.
