### A Visit to the Morefield Mine By Ken St. John



For the second time in the last year business took me to the vicinity of the Morefield Mine in Amelia Court House, Virginia. I took advantage of circumstance and arranged a visit to the mine and an underground tour with the owner, Sam Dunaway. Sam and his wife Sharon run the mine as a tourist business and include underground tours as one of their offerings. However, they manage their time carefully and are only open by appointment and then only for certain times of the year. Howe Caverns - it's not.

In researching the mine prior to my first visit, I stumbled upon an exhibit at the Smithsonian (on line) that featured three mines. The Copper Queen (I recall), Sterling Hill, and Morefield. By far, Morefield is the smallest, and like Sterling, it is accessible to the public. Unlike Sterling, Morefield is an active mine with mining operations continually on-going. The main ore being mined is Amazonite used for jewelry. Sam stocks his store with various types of Mica, some Tantalite, Quartz, Topaz (including some clear crystals), and Clevelandite along with the Amazonite and bits of other rarely occurring pegmatite minerals. He has the rarest and best pieces on permanent display. The rest of the mine output is salted, crushed and dumped in collection areas.

Morefield is a complex pegmatite. In New York we're said to have only two such deposits one of which is Batchellerville. Morefield is unique in that the mine is in the heart of the pegmatite. You are inside looking out.

The tour is quite strenuous. The mine is accessed by a series of vertical ladders made of wet 2 x 4's and re-bar. There are three levels on the tour - 30, 45 and 60 feet (the 100 foot level is flooded). I asked Sam what the criterion of physical fitness was for a visitor. His reply was a sobering, "You've got to be able to get yourself out." Since I was at the 45 foot level when I asked that question, I guessed that I'd passed the test, but I was reminded that I was underground.

Morefield Mine continued...

Since Morefield is a working mine, your tour begins with a safety briefing and a strapping on of an emergency breather. You fill out a release and stick it to the IN side of the pegboard. One good thing is that Sam has strung lights in the tour areas. Morefield is not a truly dark mine.

Imagine your hand straight and on edge. This is essentially the shape of the Morefield pegmatite. At many places in the mine, the pegmatite body has been mined away leaving the Gneiss country rock exposed on both sides of the shaft. At others, the Feldspar, Quartz and Mica are still on the walls. Tour rules require that nothing be disturbed from the mine. You walk along the drift as Sam points out Garnets, different Micas, Topaz, Clevelandite, Beryl, Fluorite, and about a dozen other mineral oddities. I've been in the mine twice and each time, Sam has bent over and found something new.

Morefield apparently has gone through several formative periods. At a point about two thirds along the shaft, the pegmatite is split by a Diabase (basalt) dike. At another, the deposit is offset and is twice as wide indicating that the pegmatite was split or folded and pressed back upon itself. Thousands of hours have been spent trying to sort out Morefield's geologic history. I asked Sam a question about the subject and his reply was, "You figure it out." No one knows for sure and speculation is part of the tour.

At various points along the drift, you see signs of the different pegmatite zones from contact to quartz core, but at no point do you see the whole picture clearly. One obvious issue is that the core is pinched and discontinuous. It's not as cut and dried as a book would lead you to believe. You can see obvious fracturing of the pegmatite rock as the dike intruded, but a few feet away you will see fractures telling a different story. The feldspar has expanded laterally into cracks in the Gneiss in several places, but not in others. Morefield is a place of contradiction. It is also a place of beauty. The Amazonite on the walls and ceilings is astounding, and as a collector, you want to chip off a chunk. However, you are in a mine, and for a minute, you think as a miner. The green of the ore becomes the green of money and you see the value in getting the stuff blasted out and hauled to the surface.

Morefield is run on the "Seven Dwarfs" mining method. Lots of hand work. Blasts will knock material from walls and faces, but from there, it's pick and shovel time. Not that blasts aren't impressive. The ground shakes, the steel plates covering the main shaft rattle up and down and birds fly from the trees.

But after the smoke clears and the dust settles, there are several tons of rubble to be moved and all the glamour has been turned into wet, back breaking work the result of which is the basis of income for the miner and his family. In a way, Morefield makes a social statement about simpler times, but it makes it in a complex, beautiful and barely understood way.
