AEG Grants and Scholarships

The AEG Foundation is dedicated to advancing research, student and professional education, and public awareness in the field of engineering geology and the related fields of environmental geology and hydrogeology through support of publications, speakers, programs, research grants, scholarships, advanced practice specialty conferences, and maintenance of archival data. The programs of the Foundation are supported by public and corporate donations and by bequests. The AEG Foundation manages ten funds including four scholarships. The Lemke Scholarship Fund was established in 2007 with a bequest from the estate of Richard and June Lemke. The fund supports student members of AEG who are sole or first authors of papers or posters presented at AEG Annual Meetings or at selected meetings of other professional or scientific organizations with which AEG is affiliated. The Marliave Scholarship Fund was established in 1968 by the Association of Environmental & Engineering Geologists (AEG). The fund name honors an eminent family of engineering geologists: Chester E. Marliave (1888-1958), and his sons Elmer C. Marliave (1910-1967) and Burton H. Marliave (1917-1991), who were pioneers in the profession. The funds are distributed as grants, which are intended to support academic activity and reward outstanding students in engineering geology and geological engineering. Recipients of grants are designated as "Marliave Scholars." Continued on page....

The Martin L. Stout Scholarship is in memory of Dr. Martin L. Stout, Professor of Geology at California State University, Los Angeles from 1960 to 1990. He is remembered by all of his students for his passionate and insightful instruction in engineering geology. Dr. Stout guided his students through and beyond the fundamentals of engineering geology, often using KodachromeTM slides for illustration. He emphasized handson experience and critical thought. Dr. Stout was well known for his expertise on mega landslides, his worldly travels, his good humor, and his gracious manner. This scholarship supports his legacy. The Norman R. Tilford Field Studies Scholarship fund was established shortly after Norm died in late 1997 while flying his small aircraft to meet a Texas A&M University student field trip. Norm was a leader in engineering geology, a Past President of AEG, and a professor at Texas A&M University. He was dedicated to teaching geology in the field. Roxanna Rowe's WCGMC SPECIALITY Blueberry Crunch;

(A hit and a tradition of the WCGMC picnics!)

1 can (20 oz) crushed pineapple
3 cups fresh or frozen blueberries
3/4 cup of suger
1 box yellow cake mix
1/2 cup margerine cut into pieces
1 cup chopped nuts
14 cup of sugar
preheat oven to 350 degrees

Pour crushed pineapple into bottom of 9 x 13 cake pan (including juice)
Pour blueberries over pineapple and sprinkle with 3/4 cup of sugar
Pour cake mix into a bowl. Cut margerine onto mix until it resmbles coarsemeal
Sprinkle the cake mixture over the fruit.

Top with nuts and sprinkle with 14 cup of sugar
bake for 35 to 40minutes or until top is bubblyand cake tests done.

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Grow a Crystal Garden*

*A modern variation on the traditional Coal Garden.

First the well-known instruction for the traditional Coal Garden:

- 4 T of water
- 4 T of non-iodized salt
- 4 T of household bluing
- 4 T of household ammonia



Mix and stir slowly until the salt is dissolved. Place broken charcoal squares in a glass bowl or other container. Slowly pan or spoon the mixture over the coal pieces. Watch the salt crystals grow.


Housewives used to add bluing to their laundry. They liked the blue cast it gave their linens. I have tried to find said bluing in the super markets around this city and could not find it for the last few years. We have tried liquid Rit dye, or the powder dye, food coloring, Easter egg coloring agents, or tempura colors. All of them will work fine to add a bit of color to the crystals. The dye is not needed to grow the crystals.

I asked myself the question, why add ammonia? It smells bad and can irritate your nose, throat, and eyes. If you use it, keep it away from your face and close the bottle immediately. The ammonia is used as an agent to speed up the evaporation of the solution. Ammonia is a gas. The household ammonia has the gas dissolved in water. It can be left out of the mix or reduced to 1 or 2 tablespoons. Keep the ratio of salt to liquid at 1 tablespoon of salt to 1 ounce of liquid or 15 ml salt to 30 ml water.

One more important item to keep in mind. Never mix any product containing ammonia with a product containing bleach. This would give off poisonous gas and should never be done.

The Crystal Garden

You need a container. Some suggestions: a pretty glass bowl, any disposable container, plastic or foil will do. A cardboard box lined with foil to make it waterproof makes a nice display case. You can cut a window in one or more sides of box.



Next gather material on which you would like the crystals to grow. Porous materials work best. Broken pieces of charcoal, pieces of sponge, brick, broken clay pot pieces, lava rocks, pumice stones, bark, wooden beads, florist sponges, shells, sand stones, the list is endless. Arrange the material in your container. Create your garden! Mix colors, shapes and textures to suit your taste. Make a saturated salt solution. Spoon slowly over the objects.

You can leave a little solution in the bottom of the container. The solution will flow into the porous material and new crystals will grow on the old crystals. Be creative, sprinkle some salt on the garden, add a little bit of a different color. After all the water is evaporated, add some more material and sparingly spoon on some saturated alum or Epsom salt solution. If you have lots of saturated solution left and want to try something else: You can make sun catchers or tree decoration to add to the garden. Cut the desired shape out of a plastic lid or white construction paper; coat the plastic or paper shape with the solution.

Let it dry and watch the fluffy crystals grow. You can punch a hole near the edge of the shape and hang it on a houseplant or in a sunny window. Keep your creations away from moisture.
