Arkansas Quartz Field Trip April 7-10, 2009 (continued from page 3)

Travel days are April 4-6; Dig days are April 7-10, traveling home April 11-12th. You travel at your own pace, alone or in small groups. It is about 1300 miles to Hot Springs from northern PA.

A group number is needed before setting the sites, so **pre-register by March 15th** with Dave M. or Cindi Newman. **Decide early (before 3/21/09).** The trip will be canceled if less than 15 register. We already have 4 signed up.

Most of us will be camping at sites along the Ouachita Reservoir. I'll be on Loop C about 8-10 miles from Mount Ida. Motellers can stay in Mt. Ida or Hot Springs. We will go to the western sites first and end with one of the Coleman mines near Jesseville. The Field Trips will start each day at 8am and this would allow you to get there from either town as they are about 40 miles apart. The meeting places change each day, so you must not miss the first one. Cell phone reception is sketchy. The first day we meet at the Fiddlers Ridge Rock Shop, north side of highway 270, west of the campground and 7 miles east of Mt. Ida.

On previous trips I have visited 5 sites out of dozens and my favorite is Fiddlers Ridge. The owner has also purchased the Bear Mine. We may visit both. Some people do not like the phantom mine site because we found no phantoms, but the clusters were nice. Each site has its own way of operating which leads to a variety of digging techniques. Sites charge about \$20 per person per day and there are no limits to the amount you can take. Last trip I collected about two 5-gallon pails from each site. We only visit one site per day (four total).

Tools: Some places you might want to have a sledge, others just a potato hook or screen box. You might be digging in the dirt for loose crystals or chunking down a boulder with a face of quartz crystals. When deciding which tools you want to bring, remember your own physical abilities. Don't bring a sledge if you can't swing it. Here's my list: crack hammer, several sharp or new chisels, a couple of small spring wedges, one sledge (no, you may not use mine), a potato hook, long handled shovel, trench shovel, 2 small pry bars (no crow bars), lots of 2 gallon pails - 5 gallon bucket of quartz is too heavy for me to carry but once at the car, material can be transferred; packing material, gloves, safety glasses, safety helmet, long jeans, leather shoes. Bring insect spray just in case. Walking distances to the digging tends to be very short.
